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The Louvre Heist: Reputation at Risk

19 October 2025

The Louvre jewelry heist occurred in broad daylight during the museums opening hours. Lasting less than seven minutes, the theft was captured on video by visitors and members of the public, see **exhibit 1** for images. The footage spread quickly across social media, amplifying the global attention. The brazen incident quickly raised questions about Louvre's security systems, and its ability to safeguard cultural heritage.

19- 20 October 2025

Within hours, the news coverage began all around the world. Headlines questioned how the most visited, high-profile institution in France could be so unprotected. On social media, the Louvre was mocked for its security failures, with viral memes and posts circulating about the heist. At the same time, journalists uncovered that museum staff had raised concerns about overcrowded exhibition rooms and understaffing months earlier, indicating that the robbery was not entirely unexpected. In June 2025, the internal situation escalated to a staff walkout as protest.

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The museum remained closed for three days, while an investigation took place, see **exhibit 2** for news coverage. The Louvre reopened on Wednesday, although the Galerie d'Apollon remained closed to visitors. The remaining pieces from the jewelry exhibition were removed and transferred to a secure off-site location for precautionary measure.

Over the following days, the focus shifted from the thieves to the institution itself. The board and top management faced increasing pressure to justify the museum's security infrastructure, given the immense historical treasures stored there. Questions revolved around the outdated camera systems and why recommended security upgrades had not been implemented, despite prior audits had raised concerns about vulnerabilities in the security. In addition, the security staff were insufficiently trained to respond to armed robberies.

24 October 2025

As a response to the heist, an emergency board meeting was held to assess the situation. Louvre's director Laurence des Cars admitted a "terrible failure"¹ in the security systems of the museum and offered her resignation to France's Minister of Culture, which was turned down.

Shortly after, the director was called to present an account to the French Senate regarding the security issues enabling the theft, where she acknowledged that the staff hadn't detected the intruders soon enough. The revelations of known security troubles shifted the narrative from an isolated criminal attack to a broader institutional failure within the existing security system.

The director admitted "there is a weakness at the Louvre, and I acknowledge it completely"². Furthermore, des Cars stated that the incident exposed a shortage of security cameras outside the Louvre, as well as broader weaknesses within the security system, including the fact that the CCTV coverage extended to only 39% of the museum's rooms.³ As a response, des Cars suggested having a police station placed inside the museum and constructing barriers around the perimeter of the Louvre to prevent vehicles from parking too close.

Three weeks after the heist, a Court of Auditors' report was released, highlighting that from 2018 to 2024 managers had prioritized spending their funding on acquiring new artwork and exhibitions rather than necessary upkeep and protection to ensure safety and security in the museum.

The Court's president heavily criticized the leadership of the Louvre stating, "Let no-one be mistaken: the theft of the crown jewels is a resounding wake-up call."⁴ Moreover, industry experts accused the museum's management of prioritizing eye-catching initiatives at the expense of essential security and conservation measures.

As of today, the French police have made seven arrests in connection to the robbery. The perpetrators are said to have been amateur criminals who left plenty of evidence in the Galerie d'Apollon and on the scene outside. This made it possible for police track and arrest suspects quickly, however, none of the stolen jewellery has been recovered.

Latest Developments in Early 2026

On 28th of January 2026, President Macron announced a large renovation plan titled Louvre: New Renaissance. The ambitious 700-million-euro project aims to modernize the museum and is expected to take up to a decade to fully complete. The improvements are planned to address the existing security issues as well as create a dedicated exhibition space for the Mona Lisa. Macron framed the overhaul as a national priority, comparing its ambition to other major French restoration efforts and presenting it as part of a broader effort to protect and promote France's cultural prestige, see **exhibit 3** for the President's online post after the announcement.

In February 2026, the director of Louvre, Laurence des Cars resigned after months of sustained pressure from politicians and public criticism over the embarrassing security failures that enabled the heist at the Louvre, see **exhibit 4** for the news. Her resignation was accepted by President Emmanuel Macron, who described it as an act of responsibility. Shortly after her departure on the 24th of February, the French government appointed Christophe Leribault, the former director of the Palace of Versailles, as the new head of the Louvre. He is expected to focus on restoring public trust, strengthening security systems and leading a broader modernization of the institution. See **exhibit 5** for a timeline of the events. Meanwhile, the stolen crown jewelry remains missing, underlining the lasting impact of the heist on Louvre's worldwide reputation.

Exhibit 4 Director's resignation



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The director of the Louvre Museum in France has resigned, months after \$102 million in jewels were stolen, according to the office of the French president.

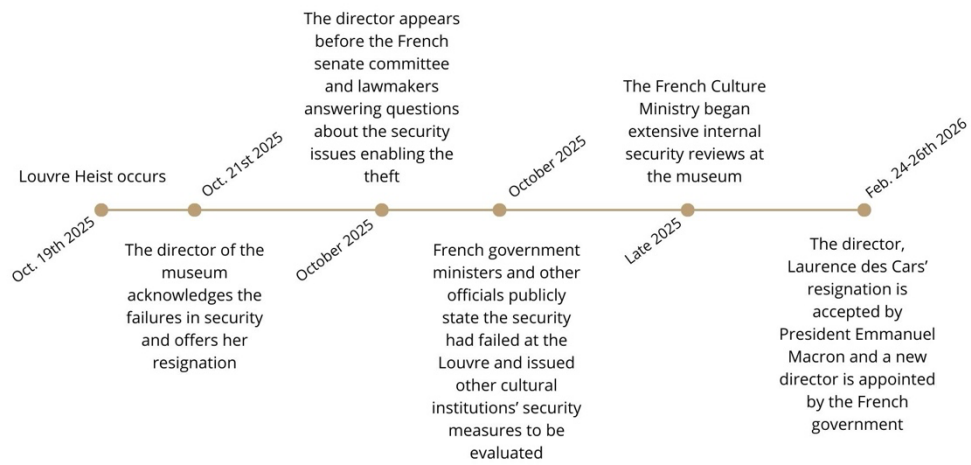
Laurence des Cars' tenure has been under intense scrutiny since the heist. At least seven suspects have been arrested in connection with the October robbery but the jewels have not been recovered.

French President Emmanuel Macron praised the resignation "as an act of responsibility at a time when the world's largest museum needs both stability and a strong new impetus to successfully complete major security and modernization projects," the Élysée said in a statement.
